Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"If living conditions continue to improve in this country," someone said, "we're going to run out of humble beginnings for our great men." Humble beginnings have to be part of the story, because people like to be able to look down so that they can see how high they have climbed. Power and wealth are a religion, with devotees all over the world, with its holy land and its holy cities, the financial capitals of the world. It has its temples, the banks, often the finest buildings in town. It has its ardent preachers, the advertisers. It even has its heroic stories that read just like the lives of the saints. A young boy from a poor family (read 'a hopeless sinner') begins with a paper round, gets a job as an office-boy, climbs, climbs, till he becomes a big man in the company; then he clinches his salvation by marrying into the company via the boss's daughter ('the unitive way, the mystical espousals').

It is God's greatest rival: the religion of Mammon. 'You cannot serve God and money,' Jesus said (Matthew 6:24; Luke 16:13). This is because money has the capacity to touch the very depths of our soul. How can it do that? It has no poetry! There are no poems about money: I can't think of a single example. It could be that it only takes over souls that have no capacity for poetry. 'If you want to see what God thinks of money,' someone said, 'look at the people he gives it to!' In itself it is not an interesting subject. It is our need and our greed that lend it interest. It is, above all, a promise: that essential component of any religion.

Its promises, however, are always just for oneself (or one's family: one's larger self). Listen to the advertisers. The underlying creed is that life has nothing to offer but what can be purchased or won, and that there is nothing either good or bad beyond that. All others are either partners or competitors: people who can help or hinder you in your search for more of the same.

I am thinking, of course, of pure devotees. Many, as in every religion, are not true believers, or have mixed motives.

There are wealthy people who have a real care for the half of the world that is malnourished. But there are others, like the rich man in the parable, who don't even notice Lazarus at their door, and who are therefore able to step over him without malice, keeping their own self-esteem intact. And there are others again who notice Lazarus but keep their self-esteem by throwing him a few scraps.

The religion of Mammon is a destructive cult. It not only destroys the poor by enriching its devotees at their expense, but it destroys the devotees themselves. They are creating 'a great chasm' between themselves and the rest of humanity, so that "those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us."

Which characters does the story ask us to identify ourselves with? The rich man, Dives? In fact he is given no name in the gospels: 'dives' is just the Latin word for 'a rich man'; the rich man has no identity except his wealth. No, we are not being asked to see ourselves as Dives. Lazarus, then? No, neither is it telling us to lie down at the rich man's door like Lazarus. The parable is telling us that we are the rich man's five brothers.

We have Moses and the prophets - and above all we have Jesus - to tell us to live by a different religion, a subversive religion that "casts down the mighty from their thrones and exalts the lowly, that fills the hungry with good things but sends the rich away empty." We are not told whether the five brothers changed their lives around. Why? Because we are the five brothers, and the story isn't over yet.

Message from the Administrator

From the 1st April 2016 Dromore Diocese has become a registered charity with the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland, and must comply with the Charity Legislation. As the new legal entity, the Dromore Diocesan Trust now subsumes Newry Parish Trust and all the other Parish Trusts which existed in the past. The new Charity Number for the Diocese, XT27177, now applies to all parishes.

This change has brought with it a number of administrative and financial management adjustments to all parishes in the Diocese, which we have been implementing on an ongoing basis.

The changes to the financial arrangements have included new procedures for the Offertory Promise Collection::

- The weekly collection is still retained in the Parish in which it is collected.
- The Special envelope collections, are, as in the past submitted to the Diocese and distributed to the relevant Diocesan Funds.
- In the past the Monthly Collections for the Priests of the Parish was retained in the Parish and apportioned among the Priests in the Parish and as a Mensal Parish, the Bishop of Dromore. This Monthly Collection is no longer retained in the Parish, but it is now also submitted to the Diocesan Fund for the Support of Priests, from which all priests in the Diocese receive a monthly stipend.

There has been a longstanding tradition in the Church where a voluntary offering may be made to a priest on the occasion of administering the sacraments. Under the new financial arrangements all of these offerings will be submitted centrally to the Diocesan Fund for the Support of Diocesan Priests. Where a Mass has been offered the Priest is permitted to retain a Mass offering from the contribution, the balance is returned to the Diocesan Fund.

Planning Application for Big Screen

Newry Mourne and Down District Council has made us aware that they are applying for planning permission to retain the big screen in its current position in Hill Street blocking the view of the Cathedral, a Grade A Listed Building.
