The Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

“Look at the birds of the air.... Consider the lilies of the field.... Do not worry about tomorrow.” There are people who would consider this New Age, if they didn't know where it came from. For many, the name 'New Age' has become a term of reproach, almost an accusation of heresy – or at the least a soft version of religion: 'Religion Lite'. People who emphasise the beauty of nature, the innate goodness of people, etc., are suspected of avoiding the reality of sin and suffering.

It is true that a spirituality that makes only slight mention or no mention at all of the Cross of Christ could hardly be called Christian. Where there is no affirmation that “Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again,” it is hard to see the shape of the Christian faith.

There are two contrasting spiritualities, then. But it would be better to think of them as two sides of the Christian faith, like the two sides of a coin. The God of creation and the God of redemption are one and the same God. It was the same Jesus who said, “Consider the lilies of the field,” and who died on the Cross.

It is important for a Christian to have a positive view of nature – nature all around us, and our own nature. The pollution of land, sea, and air in our generation is evidence that we have neglected and abused the earth. This cannot be consistent with our faith. “And God saw that it was good.” This phrase is repeated six times, like an antiphon, throughout the first chapter of the Book of Genesis. At the end of each day's work of creation, “God saw that it was good” (verses 4, 10, 12, 18, 21, 25).

And at the end of the entire work, “God saw that it was very good” (verse 31). This is the charter for a healthy-minded lyrical outlook on the natural world (of which we are a part). We are entitled to have an outlook on nature that is religious in its scope and intensity. God is everywhere manifest in nature, because it is his creature. “Every creature speaks God,” said Eckhart. It was commonplace in the Middle Ages to refer to Nature as “God's first book.”

But God's greatness and compassion are revealed even more profoundly in the work of redemption. “Jesus is the hand of God's mercy stretched out towards us,” wrote Leo the Great. We could scarcely have imagined that God was anything like the father of the Prodigal Son, if Jesus had not us invented that parable. And we would certainly not have imagined the depths of God revealed through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Remember, again, that it was this same Jesus who said, “Look at the birds of the air.... Consider the lilies of the field.... Do not worry about tomorrow.”

We are not meant to choose between these two sides of the faith, but to hold them together in fruitful tension.

Now if that is how God clothes the grass in the field which is there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you men of little faith? So do not worry; do not say, "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? How are we to be clothed?" It is the pagans who set their hearts on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on his righteousness, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.

Offertory Procession

The gifts of bread and wine which will become the Lord's body and blood are brought to the altar.

The celebrant raises the host on the paten saying:

Priest: Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands, it will become for us the bread of life.

All: **Blessed be God for ever.**

The celebrant pours wine and a little water into the chalice, saying quietly:

Priest: By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.

The celebrant then raises the chalice above the altar and says:

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become our spiritual drink.

All: **Blessed be God for ever.**

Bowing, the celebrant says quietly:

Priest: With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you, O Lord, and may our sacrifice in your sight this day be pleasing to you, Lord God.

Then the celebrant washes his hands, saying quietly:

Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin.

Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, almighty Father.

All: **May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.**

Priest: The Lord be with you.

All: **And with your spirit.**

Priest: May God bless you with every heavenly blessing, make you always holy and pure in his sight, pour out in abundance upon you the riches of his glory, and teach you with the words of truth; may he instruct you in the Gospel of salvation, and ever endow you with fraternal charity. Through Christ our Lord.

Message from the Administrator
100 Years of Fatima: Centennial Pilgrim Statue to visit Newry Cathedral

On 11th January 2017, Pope Francis blessed six statues of Our Lady of Fatima with a view to one of them being brought to each of the continents. He views this as an appeal for prayer and reparation for world peace and to promote the sanctity of family life in our world. One of those statues will arrive in Newry Cathedral on Monday 6th March at 12 noon approximately.

All parishioners are invited to come to the Cathedral and pray the Rosary before the statue of Our Lady of Fatima. A plenary indulgence is granted by Pope Francis in this Jubilee Year to those who pray before the statue.

Mass will be celebrated in the Cathedral on Monday 6th March at 7.30pm followed by a short candle light procession. After the Mass there will be the opportunity for the Diocese to be consecrated to the two hearts of Jesus and Mary. There will also be an opportunity for those who wish to be enrolled in the brown scapular. The Cathedral will remain open until Midnight to give the opportunity for public veneration.

9.30am Mass in St. Brigid's Church

From Sunday 26th February, Fr. Krzystoff has agreed that the first reading of the Mass and the Gospel would be read in English & Polish. Parishioners are welcome to come along to this Mass should they wish to attend Mass on Sunday mornings in St. Brigid's Church.

We understand the disappointment of many people in the Meadow area that the 11.30am Mass had to be taken off but with only three priests in the parish it was impossible to cover all Masses. When the numbers attending the weekend Masses was taken there was a total of 240 attending the 11.30am Mass in St. Brigid's on Sunday. On the Saturday evening Mass there were 380 attended.

It is difficult for many parishioners to appreciate fully the many calls on priests' time. We have a number of funerals each week, work in the schools of the parish, visits to the residential homes, consultations with people, meeting with various organisations as well as unexpected calls almost on a daily basis.

Not many years ago there were nine priests in Newry Parish. For a few months we were operating with three priests. We are extremely fortunate to have Fr. Damien Nejad with us until August when he will most likely return to his home diocese of Raphoe. The help of parishioners is needed so that we are able to continue the good work that is happening in Newry Parish, thanks to the generosity of many people. The PPC brings together lay people, religious, and our priests to work together in strengthening our parish as a living Christian community. The PPC is the thinking, planning, and reflection group for the parish and it needs the active support of committed parishioners to nurture and be involved in the future work of the parish.

As we come to the end of the second three-year term of office of the PPC it is time, under the PPC Constitution, to recruit new members as some current members have completed two terms in office. Through baptism each of us becomes a members of God's family. As baptised people we are also responsible for the development of our own faith as well as being co-responsible for supporting and developing the faith of our parish community.

In order to explain the role and function of a Parish Pastoral Council and the responsibility of the faith community to contribute to faith development in the parish, each one of you is invited to attend any one of four information meetings being arranged in March and April to find out more about the role and functions of the PPC and the practical ways in which you can support your parish. Details of the dates and location of each information evening will be available in the next few weeks.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS IN THE CATHEDRAL DURING LENT

The Stations of the Cross will be recited after the 10.30am Mass each Friday morning, with the exception of St. Patrick's Day, by one of the Ministers of the Word who read at the weekday Masses. This year, Pope Francis reminds us that 'Lent is a favourable time for deepening our spiritual life'.
