There is a kind of timelessness about Christmas: it takes us out of our routines; suddenly all the rush of preparation is over and there is nothing more to do. This could be the moment to experience something different from the perpetual motion that is our ordinary life. But what happens? We turn on the TV, which is what we may have been doing every single evening since last Christmas. No change. Then we say Christmas is boring, or sad, or too commercial.... Of course it is; it is just like all the other days. We have not allowed change to happen. We have not allowed space for anything new to appear. Paradoxically, all the flashing lights, the incessant television, the emailing and text-messaging...all have the effect of filling our lives and so leaving no space to move, no space for anything really different to appear; so we are enclosed in a cave of artificial lights that never lead us to the sun.

"The light shines in the darkness." But it does not shine in artificial light. We have to turn something off. We have to leave space and time for the new thing to appear.

The Child born today is God's new deed: the newest, the youngest, the most recent...the latest. But this is not announced in the excited voice of the advertisers; it is a silent deed. He is the Word made flesh, but he lies there as helpless to speak as any infant. Only in silence can this silent Word be heard. The new blade of grass does not make a scene or a noise; neither does the Word made flesh.

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CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

The reading on Christmas Eve from St. Luke's Gospel shows Jesus being born into a situation of total oppression. Luke reminds us of the political regime which controls the land and the effect this has on the people. Luke only gives one sentence to the actual birth of Jesus and then focuses his attention on the shepherds. There is a reason for their presence. Shepherds were considered 'virtually unclean' because of their close contact with animals. Their lives would have been full of poverty, fear, and struggle. So, this scene that Luke paints is not a tranquil setting, this is a setting on the margins. Everything about this story is provocative and uneasy. It is into this 'mess' God comes as a homeless child. We are being invited to expect the unexpected.

Luke begins his Gospel as he means to continue, turning the world upside down in solidarity with the outcast. He places angels rejoicing with shepherds, the highest and the lowest, giving glory to God together. The good news of Jesus' birth goes first to the marginalised. It is in their name that the shepherds are chosen. As the Gloria is sung during this Christmas season, come back to this marginal space where it was first sung, with the angels and the shepherds in a field. No boundaries, no walls, no purification rituals, but the promise of a deep peace for all, a peace for which the world desperately longs. It is for this reason we rejoice. We are invited to Bethlehem today, to open up our hearts to the One who has come. We return, like the shepherds 'glorifying and praising God for all they have seen and heard'. All are welcome to the manger. May we welcome all as God does, with compassion and love.

This year, 2020, has been a very difficult year for everyone in our community. The lockdowns were difficult and now we are facing another lockdown in an attempt to overcome the dangers of COVID 19. Please God, come the spring and it will be under control and life and living can return to normal. The Churches being closed was difficult for people but thank God parishioners were able to follow Mass from the comfort of their own homes. For all those families who suffered a bereavement, you are constantly in our prayers as the suffering was more intense without the support of family members and the community.

I commend the various individuals and groups in the parish who continued to work and offer support in the past nine months in spite of the difficulties and uncertainties encountered. Your support is appreciated very much.

When our churches reopened, we all depended on the generosity of the stewards in each of our Churches. I thank everyone of them for the time they gave to ensure that the highest level of safety was maintained. They have also done tremendous work in ensuring the Churches were thoroughly cleaned after every Mass and that it was safe for the next congregation. Their work, not easy at all times, is appreciated very much.

Gradually the readers, musicians, and singers, eucharistic Ministers were there to enhance our celebration of the Eucharist. We are deeply grateful to everyone involved in those very important ministries.

Sincere thanks to the Sisters of St. Clare for the inspiring reflections and prayers during the four Sundays of Advent. They certainly helped us prepare for the coming feast of Christmas.

This year Gaudete Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent, was blessed with a very uplifting Carol Service, a Carol Service with a difference. I thank the musicians, the singers, the readers, and the students from our Six Post Primary Schools for their contribution. All of this was able to happen on account of the expertise and dedication of Mr Mark Byrne. To you Mark we are deeply grateful.

Thanks for the work of the newly formed Parish Pastoral Council, the Parish Finance Council, and the Parish Management Group. Your sense of dedication is deeply appreciated, and I have no doubt that the parish will be further enriched by your contributions.

The 'Giving Tree', the first time in the Cathedral, and was a tremendous success. Many young people have benefited this Christmas; thanks for your generosity.

I extend a special thought to the Sick and Housebound. We regret that we have been unable to visit you since March. Please God we will be visiting you as soon as it is safe to do so. I am glad that you are able to follow Mass on the webcam.
