Just before telling us about the widow's two coins, Mark (like Luke) lets us hear Jesus denouncing the teachers of the Law "who like to be seen in long robes and love to be greeted in the marketplaces and to take the reserved seats in the synagogues and places of honour at feasts. They even devour the property of widows, while making a show of long prayers" (Mk 12:38-40). Widows were the very symbol of the helpless poor. Then when he sees this poor widow putting money ("all she has to live on") into the Temple treasury, he denounces the practice of taking money from the poor to shore up a decaying religious institution. Her very generosity is a judgment on that institution. This incident shows how effortlessly successful that institution had been in exploiting the poor. Commentators have usually put a pious interpretation on this text, praising the widow's generosity. It bears this interpretation, certainly, but it is her very generosity that condemns the avarice of the Temple authorities.

The scribes were religious scholars, proud of their status, dressed to be recognised. Along with the Pharisees they had contrived to impose twenty-four different kinds of Temple tax on the people, thus holding the poor in a terrible dilemma: either to go hungry or to break the law. "They devour the property of widows," Jesus said. Hidden behind the mask of respectability were the fangs of the predator.

This poor widow did not know that Jesus was watching her. Unlike the scribes and Pharisees she did not do things just to be seen doing them. When any virtue is deeply rooted it is unselfconscious; only superficial virtue is self-conscious. Meister Eckhart wrote, "When a virtue performs itself more by itself and for love of virtue without any why or wherefore – then one has the perfection of virtue, and not before." That poor widow had vastly greater depth than those scholarly scribes. Some things don't change much from one age and society to another. St Thomas Aquinas in the 13th century said that any little old lady (una vetera) may have deeper faith and wisdom than the most learned theologian of the day.

The widow's unselfconscious virtue, however, lets us see also how easy it is to exploit the poor; after a time it even seems the respectable thing to do. A couple of decades ago a South American bishop said, "When we defend the poor, Rome accuses us of meddling in politics – but never when we side with the rich." The Good News is as much news today as it was in the earliest times because the world hasn't changed: few care about the poor, and authorities are mainly self-serving. When help comes it comes usually from unexpected quarters.

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Message from the Administrator

In the readings this weekend, two unnamed women steal the limelight through their reckless generosity. One befriended a stranger seeking asylum in her hometown. She shared with him what she thought would be her last meal rather than ostracising him in direct provision. She risked starvation for herself and her son by sharing her meagre food resources. Following her God given instinct to care for each other she somehow trusted the same God to provide for the three of them. Her reckless generosity saved all those lives. Centuries later, her kindness is an example for all of us.

The second woman's total wealth was two small coins. Ignoring the cagey convention of her time and culture, she quietly slipped the two coins into the treasury, rather than retaining one of them as a sparse rainy-day reserve. Deep within her, she somehow realised that there is more to life security than money. Jesus sitting nearby, noticed her unobtrusive, reckless generosity. For His disciples, He contrasted her action with the ostentatious religious posturing of the local scribes in their long-tasselled robes. A challenge to hypocrisy and an inspiring example for all of us.

In recent times, we have experienced heroically dedicated women and men sacrificing themselves, their time and comfort to care for us and protect us, and to heal our vulnerable sick, even risking their lives in the process. We admire them, thank them, and ask God to abundantly reward their competence and their respectful kindness.

Kindness is the daily expression of Christ's presence among us. Kindness is the embryo of trust and trust in the seedbed for growth in harmony and peace. Kindness is a two-way avenue to forgiving and restoring trust. Kindness, no matter how small always bears fruit and retards the growth of violence. What coins will Jesus see me put into the treasury of kindness and love today and this week? May your spirit come upon us.

At this critical moment for the church Pope Francis has called a synod and has invited all believers to make a contribution. It's easy for us to see this as a call to professional church people, clergy and religious. They have always taken care of this kind of thing. Now the call is that the voices of the little ones can also be heard. How can you help this to happen in your church community?

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
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
